"The Impact Camp Sacajawea has on Girl Scouting and Girls"

When we joined the GS organization during Anya's Kindergarten year in 2013, we loved our meetings and adored our sweet, little Daisy troop. But when we set foot onto Camp Sacajawea for Day Camp in the summer of 2014, we were instantly hooked into scouting in a way that only Camp Sacajawea could induce. The grounds offered a beautiful, outdoor oasis in the middle of our small city. When we first entered through the gate and read the Girl Scout green signs of the law, we truly felt like official Girl Scouts. When we first hiked the trails that overlooked the James River we knew we were in a very special place meant for very special girls. When we ended our first day at Day Camp with our largest friendship circle, where we were literally physically connected to so many wonderfully creative and remarkably intelligent girls and women of all ages and backgrounds, we knew we had BECOME Girl Scouts. To say that Camp Sacajawea has had an impact on our scouting experience would be an understatement. In those discussions, we often have differing opinions on what was fun or what we liked the most, but when asked what our favorite part of Girl Scouts is, we are in total agreement that Camp Sacajawea is our favorite Girl Scout activity and memory. The 58th GSVSC Annual Meeting (virtual) was held Saturday, January 23rd from 10:00 am – 12:30 pm, led by GSVSC CEO Nikki Williams and Board Chair Dawn Weise. Along with our delegates, Amy, Erika and Rebecca we had good representation from our service unit. The overall program was most informative with lots of positive messages and a wonderful key note speaker. Some of the highlights:

GSVSC started in 1963

- Treasurer's Report/Where the money comes from/source of Income: Allocation of all funds: fundraising, 5%; management and general, 7%; program and membership

services, 87%.

- Breakdown of all incoming funds: program fees 1%, United Way allocations 1%, Retail sales 2%, other 3%, contributions and grants 11%, Cookie Sales and Nut and Candy Sales 83%.

- Fund Development: Donors increased by 7% with more making multiple gifts throughout the year - gained several new sponsors - increase in grant

request/approval.

Highest Award Scouts 2020 - 139 girls from our council dedicated over 4,800 service hours to their communities through Take Action projects that focused on a variety of causes. 12 Gold Award Girls Scouts - 29 Silver Award Girl Scouts and 98 Bronze Award Girl Scouts.

Strategies to be put in place for membership year '21-'22 to build back membership... 3 - 5 year plan for rebuilding. Included would be updating our three camps to offer more programming and year around camping experiences such as resident camps. Since March 2020, GSVSC transitioned to a virtual world creating new opportunities:

1) schedule availability, 2) new innovative ways to work programs, camps and recruitment, 3) farther reach for programming, 4) more direct interaction with girls with increase in highest award trainings reaching more girls.
