The New Girl Scout Cookie. What is Raspberry Rally?

- Thin, crispy cookie infused with raspberry flavor and dipped in chocolaty coating, dubbing it the "sister cookie to the beloved Thin Mints," the top selling cookie. It is made from vegan ingredients.
- Raspberry Rally will only be available to customers on line through the Direct Ship

program.

- No cookies will be removed from the usual line up.
- Limited quantity, so when they are gone, they are gone.

Choosing a Troop Crest: Symbol of a troop's goal and main interest. It should have a special meaning for them. Once chosen, a crest is used for the life of the troop. If an entire troop bridges to the next level and forms a new troop, they may either keep the crest from the previous level or select a new one.

- **Arrow:** The arrow stands for action and moving forward, hope to do a lot to change the world.
- Bee: The bee symbolizes hard work and industry hard workers who inspire others.
- Blue Bird: The blue bird stands for happiness and good fortune...you want to spread cheer wherever you go.
- Carnation: One of the first two troop crests, stands for health and energy. Sounds like the right symbol for friends who have tons of energy.
- Crane: Stands for strength, gracefulness and loyalty. You are always true to friends and values.
- **Eagle:** The eagles' excellent eye sight helps it see important details. With this crest, shows that you want to bring focus and hard work to whatever you do.
- Lei: Hawaiian lei is a symbol of friendship, love and peace. Choose it to share your wish to spread peace and good will in the world.
- **Lightning**: Bolt of lightning stands for inspiration and creative power.
- Nautilus Shell: The Nautilus shell grows into larger chambers throughout its life. Symbol shows that you will keep growing and changing inside and out.
- Pansy: Pansies stand for loving thoughts and special friendships. This symbol shows the bonds you have with all your Girl Scout sisters.
- **Shooting Star:** Shooting stars are rare, unexpected and beautiful! Choosing this symbol shows that you are like a shooting star...a troop that lights up the world.
- **Sun:** The sun represents warmth and life, helps plants and trees grow strong. Choosing this crest shows that you want to spread good cheer, help yourself and others grow.
- **Trumpet:** When a trumpet sounds it announces that you're ready to march into action. You might choose this symbol to remind others of your courage to take action to make the world a better place.
- Waterfall: A waterfall is always in motion, but it always looks the same. Choosing the waterfall shows you want to stay true to what you believe though the world is always changing.
- White Rose: The white rose stands for new beginnings, maybe that is why it was one of the first two troop crests. It's a wonderful symbol for girls who are starting out on an adventure.

How to Play

It's just like Simon Says, so (from what we remember, and how we play it) have the girls stand at one end of the room, and the Speaker at the other. The Speaker picks a card out of the stack, and reads it to them. If they say "Juliette Says" before the action (like, "Juliette Says put your hands on your knees") the players need to do that action.

If the Speaker doesn't say "Juliette Says" but only says the action (like, "roar like a lion") the players don't do that action. If the players do any action that Juliette didn't tell them to do, they go back to the starting line.

The kids will need to pay attention to what you are saying, because not only do they need to know if "Juliette Says" to do it or not, but some actions will also have a specific number of times they need to do that action, (like jump 3 times). If the Speaker tells them to do an action that is continuous, (like "do jumping jacks"), they will need to keep doing until the Speaker says "Juliette Says Stop" or until another action allows them to stop.

For example, if the Speaker says "Juliette Says touch your knees," they should keep doing this until the Speaker

gives the next instruction.

If the Speaker then says

"Juliette Says march
in place 5 times,"

this will allow them stop the previous action because they can't do both at the same time! But if the Speaker says, "Juliette Says stick our your tongue", they need to keep their hands on their knees, because the new action doesn't cancel the first. (You can be as lenient as you want on this.)

You will notice that not every action has the players moving forward. Some will have a action that they do in place, or even have them back up! This helps the game to last a bit longer, but you can always change up the cards as you are reading them, if you need to make the game longer or wrap it up sooner!

Also, these cards are just suggestions of things for the players to do, but feel free to add any of your own actions, or jump around through the deck to get one that works. It's nice to do some in place actions, then some that travel, and then some that are silly... A REALLY fun way to "catch" them that my hubby does, is read "Juliette Says do 3 bunny hops forward" and the girls do that. Then he says "Ok, now do 2 more" and almost every time, they would keep going! It was so funny!!

The object of this game is to have fun, and to be the first to make it all the way to the finish line (or any predetermined spot) - although we usually just play until it's time to go, with no real winner. We have several girls who are really good at the game, and a few who are not, so we were really lenient on sending her back to start, so you can just see what works

for your group! The goal is to be silly, have fun, and not hurt anyone's feelings... Hope you like it!


