Current status on our nine trails at Camp Sacajawea:

- Thanks to Emily, Troop 40, the **Animal Tracker Trail** has just opened. She is now creating a program "The Animal Tracker Trail's Fairy Trail Adventure." Girls hiking this trail and completing this program can earn the Trail Adventure Badge (D-B-J). This activity tub will be kept at Sunspot. Trail blaze color: orange (0.29 miles)
- The Chapel Trail will be opened and reblazed by the end of September by at least 30 of our Cadettes. Takes you to a lovely meditation area. Trail blaze color: Sands of Time (white)...look for the white steps off the camp road (0.05 miles)
- Boy Scouts from Pack 7, First Presbyterian Church, will start on the **James River Trail** mid September, taking it down a little past the Pavilian Trail intersection. Trail blaze color: blue (0.60 miles)
- The **Pavilion Short-Cut Trail** connector between Pavilion Campsite and James River Trail is open. Trail blaze color: green (0.05 miles)
- The **Skinny Dip Hole Trail** looks great and what Sky, Anya and Elizabeth have done so far to improve the entire area around our swimming hole! It is amazing!! A large pipe that crosses Judith Creek above the swimming hole must be replaced by the city of Lynchburg so Skinny Dip Hole and Trail are temporarily closed. Trail blaze color: purple (0.24 miles)
- Cadette Troop 9730 has just started their plans toward cleaning up and opening the **Great Excursion Trail**. This will include the construction of steps, small bridge...this will be a winter project. Trail blaze color: neon yellow (0.40 miles)
- The new **Mama Stump Trail** will be ready by Spring '22 and will take you to the observation site of the Camp Sacajawea Eagle's nest. An activity tub is being created sharing all we know about this family. Trail blaze color: TBD
- The "Sweetheart Trail" that takes us down to the lower end of the James River Trail connects to the Judith Creek Trail and our canoes. This will be a winter project opened up by spring. Trail blaze color: red (0.25 miles)
- Judith Creek Trail follows closely the Judith Creek with a cliff side overlook site. It leads to boating access point for kayaking/canoeing. Trail blaze color: yellow (0.15 miles)

Thanks to Ranger **Tim** for helping us get started on the Mama Stump Trail and the many, many **volunteers** who are working so hard to get all the trails open.

COVID-19 Protocols/new changes 8/16/21

- GSVSC continues to operate in Phase IV
- Leaders/troops need to review the outline GSVSC COVID protocols to stay current "COVID-19 Response Guidelines for Volunteers"
- communicable disease not covered under the GSUSA: general liability policy provided through GS membership
- pre-screen; confirm temperature checks and collect COVID-19 Questionnaire (#1082) and COVID-19 waiver, participation agreement and pledge – Girl Scout Culture of Care Pledge #1083 for all participants prior to participation in any Girl Scout activity.
 - keep stellar travel roster health records
 - routinely clean areas
 - obtain signed parent/caregiver permission slips
 - communicate and enforce all COVID-19 exposure mitigation guidelines
 - follow proper COVID-19 exposure reporting procedures
- While gathering indoors, face masks are required for every child and adult regardless of vaccination status – when possible, participants should go outside and be at least 6 feet away from others for extended mask breaks.
- While gathering outdoors face masks are required regardless of vaccination status.
- Avoiding personal contact...hugging, handholding, high fives, handshakes, etc. GSVSC will add to these guidelines September 3, 2021.

First Aid Certification

- Council approved First Aid/CPR/AED class providers
 - American Red Cross
 - American Heart Association
 - National Safety Council
 - American Safety + Health Institute
 - Medic First Aid
 - SOLO (Stonehearth Opening Learning Opportunities)
- Caution: First Aid/CPR training that is available entirely online does not satisfy Girl Scout's requirements. Such courses do not offer enough opportunities to practice and receive feedback on your technique. Get approval from council prior to enrolling in a course with any online component.
- The presence of an advanced first aider (MD, EMT, etc.) is required at resident camps, day camps...For large events, with 200 people or more there should be additional first aiders, one advanced first aider for every 200 participants. The following healthcare providers may serve as advanced first aiders for large groups: physician, physician assistant, nurse practitioner, registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, paramedic, military medic and emergency medical technician.

 - o 20% discount
 - Expiration date: 9/16/22

• Wilderness First Aider: if you will not be able to get help within 30 minutes (arrival time/minimal cell service with you) you will need a WF Aider.

Program and Training Updates

- 1) Adult membership and background checks are required:
 - When chaperoning or providing supervision of girls (other than their own) to fulfill the girl to adult ratio
 - When providing direct service (program or training) to girls without the presence of troop leaders or approved GS volunteer chaperones
 - When driving girls (other than their own) to and from all GS activities
 - When handling/managing GS products (fall products/cookies)
 - When attending a GS trip and/or overnight
- 2) Event Planning
 - Program events require proper planning and proper budgeting.
 - Event Director responsible for:
 - Creating the budget
 - o Ensuring event committee members are well trained, know their role, expectations and budget limits
 - o Communicating changes in plans, budget, guidelines and expectations to all committee members and helpers
 - Budget to the minimum participants to cover all expenses to ensure events break even. Do not recommend allowing registration and payment at the door.
 - Break even events net less than \$100
- 3) Additional money-earning fundraising efforts must have council pre-approval. Submit: Additional Group Money-Earning Activities #2131 via info@gsvsc.org
- 4) Each troop must have at least one or more co-leaders who are not related. All co-leaders are required to complete training, complete adult membership application to be a member of that troop, and have a cleared back ground check. All of this is done on line.
 - Men may serve as troop leader when a non-related adult female is present.

We are served by local volunteers who make up the Service Unit Administrative Team, providing the day to day work of "running" the operations of the Lynchburg/Campbell County Service Unit...everything from budget planning, event planning, recruitment, placement, mentoring, general upkeep of Camp Sacajawea...a great deal of volunteer effort and hours go into planning meetings, events, activities and trainings.



Etiquette for Girl Scout SWAPS

<u>Girl Scouts</u> have all sorts of fun and interesting traditions. One of those is SWAPS, which stands for "Special Whatchamacallits Affectionately Pinned Somewhere" or simply "Shared With A Pal."

SWAPs are small tokens of friendship that girls exchange with other Girl Scouts they meet. They come in handy when you meet a lot of different troops during events like World Thinking Day, summer camps, and when you travel with your girls.

These little goodies don't have to be complicated or expensive. Instead, they should be handmade and have a connection to your girls and your troop. They don't have to look perfect, but they should have personality. Most importantly, they should be fun to make, give and receive.

SWAPs are a great way to celebrate new and existing friendships. They are a memento of the friends your <u>scouts</u> make along the way. Encourage your scouts to make and share them. They'll be glad they did down the road when these little "Special Whatchamacallits" help them remember new friends and fun travel experiences.

SWAP-Making Etiquette

While there isn't really "etiquette" for making SWAPs, there are some things to keep in mind.

Don't spend a lot of money on SWAPs. Part of the Girl Scout Law is to use resources wisely. Consider whether you can use recycled items such as bottle caps or bread tags. Look through your stash of materials left over from prior crafts. You may have pony beads, craft sticks, or chenille stems that can be repurposed.

Although many SWAPs have safety pins and are designed to be pinned to vests or sashes, SWAPs don't have to be a pin. They can be necklaces, bracelets, patches, or other small items.

SWAPs should be handmade. Your Girl Scouts can brainstorm what they would like to make. They may want their SWAPs to match the theme of the event. For a campout, your troop may want to make camping-themed SWAPs such as this <u>bedroll</u> or <u>campfire</u>.

You can find plenty of suggestions and instructions for SWAPs online (Pinterest is a good resource). Simply search for "Girl Scout SWAPs." To find themed SWAPs, add a keyword such as "Girl Scout SWAP hiking" or "Girl Scout SWAP World Thinking Day." You can also narrow your search to look for SWAPs that are easy, inexpensive or made from recycled materials.

Other Girl Scout troops are another great source of SWAPs ideas. You don't want to copy their SWAPs exactly, but they may inspire your girls as they are deciding what they want to do.

If you are short on time, there are websites that offer SWAP kits for sale. These typically include all the supplies you need, instructions and a completed SWAP as an example. The supplies are often pre-cut. While this is a great time-saver, the girls might not be as invested in these since there is less work they'll need to do.

Don't include any kind of food on your SWAP. It will attract bugs and possibly other animals. Food can't be kept very long, so girls won't be able to keep your SWAP.

Weather can be unpredictable, so make sure your SWAP is weatherproof. It would be a shame to have all the girls' hard work go to waste if the swap disintegrates during a rain shower.

It's a good idea to attach a little note with the Girl Scout's name, the troop number and possibly even the location and date of the meeting. This will make it easier for your girls to remember down the road what SWAP they received where. But be cautious with the girls' personal information. Don't include their full names or home addresses.

SWAP Swapping Etiquette

When Girl Scouts swap SWAPs, there are certain norms that should be followed so that all girls can enjoy the experience.

SWAPs intended for trading that are taken to a meeting or event should be in a box or baggie. SWAPs pinned to the hat or vest are usually considered off-limits unless a Scout offers it to you.

Basic rules of politeness apply when it comes to swapping. Remember, part of the <u>Girl Scout Law</u> says that "I will do my best to be... friendly and helpful, considerate and caring," and the other girl put her best effort into making the SWAP.

Use the Golden Rule and treat the other girl like you would want to be treated.

- Say a heartfelt "thank you" when you receive a SWAP.
- Don't refuse an offer to swap. It's considered rude.
- Never say anything negative about a SWAP you receive.
- If you see a girl with few pins or nothing to trade, offer to simply give her a SWAP.
- When you are passing a SWAP, make sure the pin is closed so that no one gets stuck.
- Don't pin your SWAP onto the other girl. Allow her to do that.

Remind your girls that if they receive a SWAP they don't really like or one they already have, they can swap it with other Scouts. The Girl Scouts should accept each pin offered with a smile and can decide what they want to keep and what they want to trade later.
